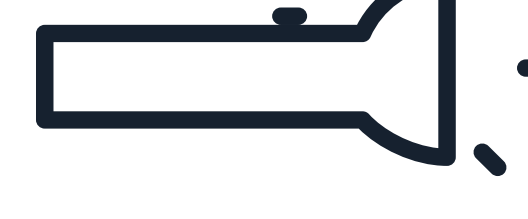

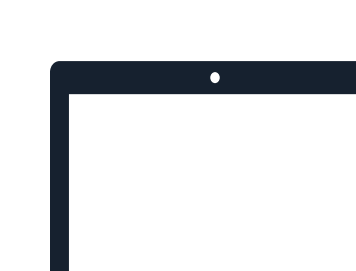

February is Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month

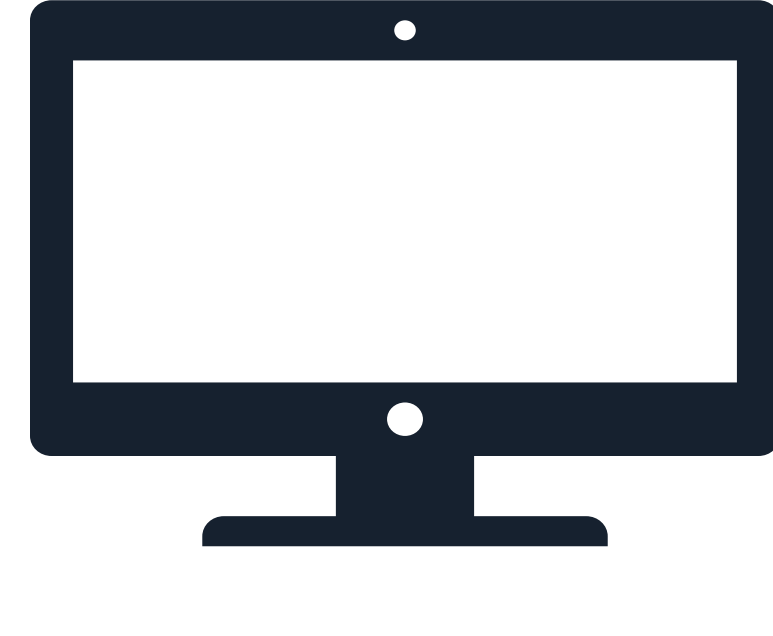
Teen Dating Violence by the numbers

- 1.5 million U.S. high school students experience physical abuse from a dating partner each year
- 1 in 3 U.S. teenagers is a victim of sexual, physical, emotional, or verbal abuse from a dating partner
- Girls and young women ages 16-24 experience the highest rate of IPV
- 81% of parents do not believe teen dating violence is an issue

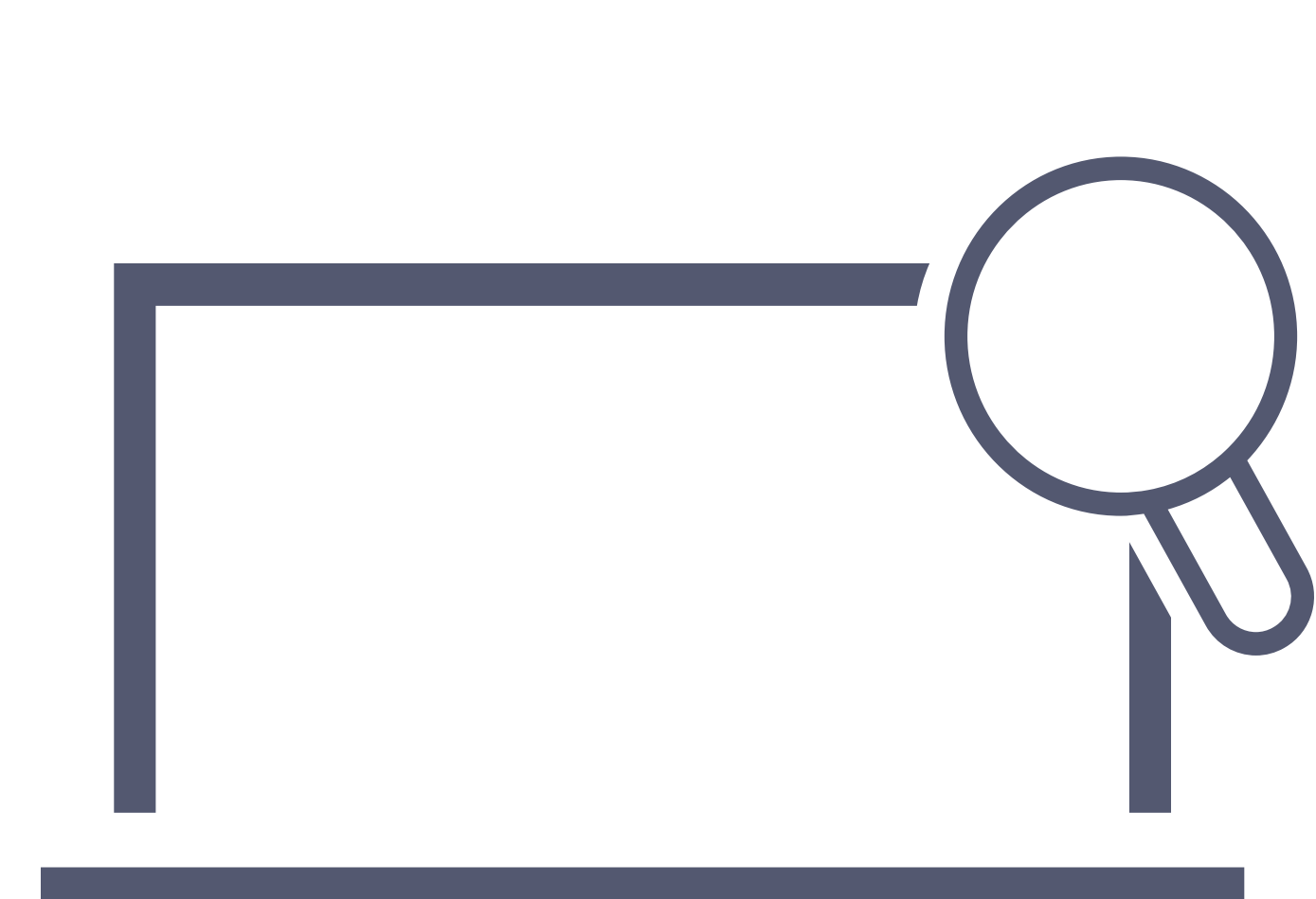
